Rela compositions in Keherwa Taal require speed, control, and rhythmic accuracy, making them a challenge for tabla players.

 - Use a metronome or Lehra (melodic loop) to stay in sync.
 - Practice with a tabla teacher or online tutorials for accuracy.
- 4. Experiment with Variations
 - Try different stroke combinations like Dha Dha Tre Ke Tre Ke for a unique sound.
 - Add gaps (rests) to create interesting rhythmic patterns.
