Vibhag Beats Bols Clap/Wave

1st 3 Dha Dhin Dhin Clap (Sam)

2nd 4 Dha Tin Tin Ta Clap

3rd 3 Ta Dhin Dhin Wave (Khali)

4th 4 Dha Tin Tin Ta Clap

Counting Pattern:

123 | 4567 | 8910 | 11121314

Theka (Basic Pattern):

Dha Dhin Dhin | Dha Tin Tin Ta | Ta Dhin Dhin | Dha Tin Tin Ta

When played at a slow tempo, it creates a grand, expansive rhythmic atmosphere, perfect for expressive improvisations.

The Kayda: Dha Tirkit Tak Dhati

A kayda in tabla is a structured composition based on a theme (or mukh), followed by variations that adhere to the same rhythmic and compositional rules.

Basic Theme (Mukh): Dha Tirkit Tak Dhati Dha Tirkit Tak Dhati Dha Ge Na | Tirkit Tak Dhati Dha Ge Na |

This kayda demonstrates the balance between clarity, control, and creativity. The use of "Tirkit" introduces fast, rolling strokes, while "Dhati" anchors the rhythm with a graceful touch.

- Pro Tip for Learners:
 - Start slow (vilambit laya) to ensure clarity of each syllable (bol).
 - Use a metronome or tanpura app to maintain the 14-beat cycle.
 - Once comfortable, increase speed (madhya laya) and experiment with variations.
